I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Landscape Design/Horticulture II is a one-year course, which builds on the basic skills and knowledge gained in Landscape Design/Horticulture I. This will be accomplished through review along with classroom and greenhouse activities. Units of study will include but not be limited to: Plant science, plant propagation, greenhouse management, integrated pest management, plant growth regulators, non-power and power landscape equipment and FFA activities. Students in Landscape Design /Horticulture II will be introduced to using plants and hardscapes in the landscape as part of their design and lab activities. The student's basic landscape design drawings will be expanded and developed for actual planting where possible. They will plan, plant and maintain a vegetable and flower garden. Entrepreneurial skills and business interest of the students will be developed through group and individual activities including class presentations and simulated landscape situations.

Time Frame: 1 year
